According to your 2023-2024 FAFSA, either you or your parent <u>may</u> have used an incorrect tax filing status on your 2021 federal tax return.

What does this mean? What should I do next?

First, determine if a taxpayer listed on the FAFSA (you or your parent) used an incorrect tax filing status on their 2021 federal tax return:

- **Single**. This status is for taxpayers who **aren't married**, or who are divorced or legally separated under state law. *Limited exceptions apply*
- Married Filing Jointly. If taxpayers are married, they can file a joint tax return. If a spouse died in 2021, the widowed spouse can often file a joint return for that year.
- Married Filing Separately. A married couple can choose to file two separate tax returns.
- **Head of Household**. In most cases, this status applies to a taxpayer who is not married and meets special rules. *Limited exceptions apply*
- Qualifying Widow(er) with Dependent Child. This status may apply to a taxpayer if their spouse died during 2019 or 2020 and they have a dependent child. Other conditions also apply.

1. What should be done if a taxpayer INCORRECTLY filed as Single or Head of Household because the taxpayer was not divorced or legally separated? Complete steps 1a – 1c.

The 2021 tax return must be corrected before our office can complete your financial aid review.

- 1a. Use Form 1040-X to correct the 2021 federal tax return (s) using either Married Filing Joint, or Married Filing Separate for the new tax filing status.
- 1b. Submit a **signed** copy of any Form 1040-X submitted to the IRS.
- 1c. Submit a signed copy of the original 2021 Federal 1040 submitted to the IRS for both spouses.

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2. What should be done if a CORRECT tax filing status was used – the taxpayer previously filed as Single or Head				
of Household but is now married? Complete steps 2a – 2c.
